We join Jews from around the world in celebrating this harvest festival. Our resource offers you opportunities to connect to the symbolism of Sukkot through the fruits represented and the stories shared.

A sukkah (Hebrew for hut or booth) is a temporary dwelling place that reminds us that Jews can make a home wherever we are. A sukkah has open walls, which is a symbol of welcome for guests to enter. On each page, we have stories of Jews from around the world and a chance to invite virtual "guests" to bring into your sukkah.

In celebration of the harvest, it is customary to hang fruits in our sukkah. A diversity of fruits, like the diversity of the Jewish people, brings signs of new life and abundance that remind us to celebrate the Jewish joy in our lives. We have for you eight fruits from around the world for the eight days of Sukkot, with a QR code linked to the story of a Jewish person from the fruit's country.

Print out this resource to display in your sukkah, or enjoy the stories online! We hope children and adults alike will also enjoy getting creative and coloring in the fruits.




MANGO - ETHIOPIA




